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

Why is the Corps Changing its Feasibility Study Process?



USACE Planning Portfolio Management

- Reducing the number of studies in "active" portfolio
- USACE has a backlog of authorized studies that have not been funded; studies that have been going on for a long time that need to be completed
- Discussions at all levels National, Regional, and local - so that USACE/USFWS/NOAA resource focus is on jointly-prioritized projects

Importance of Scoping & Planning



Focus on alternatives evaluation to identify a tentative plan for more detailed design

Focus on scaling the measures and features for the recommended plan/LPP



Agency-to-Agency Coordination

USFWS, NOAA and USACE have been working together and sharing information:

- Common understanding of agency processes
- How requirements of NEPA, ESA, Fish & Wildlife Coordination Act, Marine Mammal Protection Act, and others overlay with USACE process
- Developing a joint Communication Plan for the field



The Critical Role of the Resource Agencies

- Established roles under environmental statutes in water resource development processes are retained and re-emphasized
- Coordination begins at the outset of the study, including participation during Reconnaissance study and at early Planning charettes, engaging as full project partners



Fish & Wildlife Service Perspectives

- The Service supports SMART Planning
- Front-loading Service engagement provides for:
 - Fewer contentious projects
 - Avoidance of resources with high-conflict potential before major planning investments
 - Streamlined consultations
- The Service will prioritize project engagement based on relative conservation needs

Fish & Wildlife Service Perspectives

- Shorter timeframes require a joint commitment to support rapid, early engagement
- Revisions to 2003 Transfer Funding Agreement may examine:
 - Applicability to authorities beyond FWCA, e.g. ESA
 - More fluid and predictable processes
 - Existing District-to-Field Office, project-by-project model
 - Ensuring capacity to meet needs is available



National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration Perspectives

- Early engagement on feasibility studies will help protect NOAA trust resources
- Evaluations must consider NOAA
 responsibilities under multiple mandates (ESA,
 MMPA, MSA/EFH, FWCA, potentially NMSA)
- NOAA recognizes working with the Corps in the SMART planning paradigm presents both challenges and opportunities



National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration Perspectives

- Reduction in the number of active projects allows us to focus on those of greatest concern
- Combined reviews under multiple statutes provides an opportunity to improve effectiveness, and leverage staff resources
- Projects in the regions can provide opportunities to test and then refine the interagency process
